

She has co-led several large-scale research projects focusing on processes of change both in New Zealand and the United States of America. Her recent work focuses on ways to address challenges of change in order to support educational organisations in becoming increasingly responsive to the educational needs of their students.



Dr Mei Kuin Lai is Associate Director of the Woolf Fisher Research Centre at The University of Auckland, a research centre recognised as one of New Zealand's most successful in improving educational results for children from diverse communities. Her research focus is on how teachers and leaders can use data to improve teaching and school practices and raise student achievement. Mei has led and co-led national and large-scale projects on improving and sustaining student's literacy achievement across a variety of contexts, from high poverty multi-cultural schools to rural primary and high schools.



Dr Claire Sinnema is a senior lecturer in the Faculty of Education, The University of Auckland. Her research focuses on the improvement of teaching and learning across four main strands - curriculum implementation, teacher professional learning (in particular through practitioner inquiry and teacher evaluation), pedagogy, and school leadership. Claire is concerned with understanding how both teachers and principals improve their practice in ways that positively influence learning outcomes. Her research also explores how policy contributes to such improvement.

Overview

The University of Auckland Master of Professional Studies, with a focus on Educational Leadership, has been tailored for delivery to current and future educational leaders. It is designed to enable educators to understand, apply and critique research on educational leadership, especially recent empirical research on the links between types of leadership and student outcomes.

It is appropriate for those working in any type of educational setting, including early childhood education, primary schools, secondary schools and tertiary institutions. The programme provides rich opportunities for educators to learn the knowledge and skills they need to make a bigger difference to the learning achievement and wellbeing of students.

Master of Professional Studies in Education

The Master of Professional Studies in Education, with a focus on Educational Leadership, is a Masters programme for current and future school leaders.

National and international research emphasises the need for effective educational leadership and reveals how closely related excellent leadership is to high quality and high equity outcomes for 21st Century education systems.

The University of Auckland Master of Professional Studies in Education provides participants with the theoretical understandings and practical skills needed to make a difference to the quality of education in their current and future workplaces, leading to improved student achievement and outcomes.

This programme allows participants to build knowledge, skills and experience in critiquing and understanding educational research and provides an opportunity for in-depth study of research relevant to educational leadership. Participants will also undertake their own research in an area of choice relevant to educational leadership, allowing participants to apply their learning back to their own context.

In New Zealand, graduates who have studied and researched Educational Leadership have demonstrated that they become valuable assets in the school system no matter what position they might hold or their years of experience.

Graduates of this programme who achieve a grade average of B+ or higher are eligible to apply to undertake further research at doctorate level.



Programme delivery and staffing

The programme is equivalent to one fulltime year of study and can be completed within 18 months by part-time study. Students will be encouraged to complete within a two year timeframe.

All teaching on the programme will be conducted by experienced members of the Faculty of Education, University of Auckland. This gives participants the opportunity to work closely with University of Auckland researchers who are influencing New Zealand, and international, educational policy and practice.

Programme structure

The Master of Professional Studies in Education consists of two taught courses of 30 points each and a 60-point dissertation.

1. Educational Leadership (EDPROFST 738)
2. Undertaking Research for School Improvement (EDPROFST 757)
3. MEd Dissertation (EDPROFST 793)

Delivery

Each taught course will consist of a face-to-face intensive block course taught in Singapore by University of Auckland staff, along with online delivery. There will be regular email contact and online discussion sessions during the online delivery.

For the dissertation, each student will have the opportunity of an individual session assisting them to begin their dissertation and then they will work under close supervision by a faculty member from The University of Auckland.

Entry criteria

The Master of Professional Studies in Education programme accepts a wide range of qualifications for entry, including:

- a four-year bachelors degree; or
- a bachelor (honours) degree ; or
- a three-year bachelors degree and a professional qualification in Education equivalent to one year's advanced study.

In addition, all applicants must have at least three years of teaching experience.

Qualifications and experience in related fields that The University of Auckland assesses as equivalent to the above can be considered upon application.

Applicants who have not completed two years of full-time study in an English medium institution will need to take either an IELTS test or TOEFL and gain the equivalent of 7.0 overall grade on IELTS (with no band score less than 6.5).
